PROGRAMME CO-FUNDED BY THE EUROPEAN UNION

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What do you think the most important challenges ArcheoDanube will address?

Karin: For me, the biggest challenge is to get people excited about their cultural heritage and to make them realise that every single Euro spent on preserving our cultural heritage is not a subsidy but the best possible investment in the economy, job preservation, job creation and quality of life. This is not easy to convey in the complexity of the context, because it is usually linked to long-term developments, but meanwhile we have good enough practices throughout Europe – including in the field of archaeology – to prove it. This is why ArcheoDanube has this strong stakeholder involvement approach, because only by involving those affected from the very beginning can we meet the real challenges, namely the destruction and decay of our cultural heritage.

Katharina: ArcheoDanube tackles the usually conflictual relationship between urban centers and archaeological heritage. The project namely aims to build a bridge between urban development and heritage preservation, on which all citizens and tourists can walk towards a fervid future without forgetting our common past. Some towns have already lost their archaeological heritage and have too late recognized that this loss is irreversible. In the end, the project fights for our right (and for the right of future generations) to have the possibility to enjoy archaeological heritage. But, we have to consider that the use-it-or-lose-it principle exerts sensible pressure also on the heritage sector, so the project searches for appropriate use and functions of archaeological heritage, that is within archaeological parks.

BACKGROUND OF ARCHEO-DANUBE

Why are archaeological parks important in the life of a modern city?

KARIN DRDA-KÜHN KATHARINA ZANIER Katharina: An archaeological park is like a window to the past of your city. The past is important for the identity of communities living in a place. The past is almost for all of us interesting: who would not use a time machine to visit the venue of ancient events? Here you are: archaeological parks enable you to do exactly this, a journey through the time. For this reason, this kind of sites have enormous potential four tourism. As we all witnessed, the current COVID-19 situation has shown unexpected vulnerability of the tourism sector, especially of long distance tourism. This raises the importance of the valorization of new, alternative tourism destinations especially in the frame of domestic tourism, with great capacities of growth also in "normal" times particularly as a sustainable and inclusive form of tourism. In this perspective archaeological parks can play really an important and attractive role. Karin: Archaeological parks in the inner city area are first of all very close to people: they are usually visible, sometimes directly accessible. If they are carefully and thoughtfully developed, they can be a counter-project to hectic urban life. Personally, I always find that archeoparks radiate a great deal of peace and serenity, and I am convinced that many people feel this way and also enjoy it. Archeoparks in the city can be oases of peace, places of cultural education, venues for events - these are essential elements of an attractive city. I think it does us urban people good to sit on a summer evening on warm stones that our ancestors worked on 2000 years ago with inimitable craftsmanship. A brief moment of reflection places us in our own history - I know that many people feel this magic of looking at human history in archaeological sites very strongly. This is what makes our European cities unique - we are part of thousands of years of urban history.

Why is it useful for cities to work with ArcheoDanube project?

Karin: To put it quite banally, ArcheoDanube gives cities access to an incredible pool of knowledge which, in the form chosen, would not be so easy to organise or finance on the market. Representatives of the cities involved in ArcheoDanube, whether they are administrations, citizens, museums or service providers, will have access to a European network of experts who will provide practical support in the valorisation of cultural heritage. Cultural heritage is part of our common European identity. And it is something else we should not underestimate: Projects such as ArcheoDanube are an expression of European solidarity by sharing experience, knowledge and funding.

Katharina: It is not so easy to make archaeological heritage understandable, usable and attractive. Archaeological remains are injured and fragile relics, with special needs in relation to conservation procedures if we would like to display them. They are not usable as they are (unlike other types of heritage, e.g. a castle that can be renovated and used in a similar as it was designed for): a new concept of use and cornice has to be designed. Strong efforts are necessary to explain and visualize their interpretation (or better all of their interpretations, as archaeologists have normally different opinions). That's all quite demanding! In the ArcheoDanube we will focus on all these tasks and design a reference methodology in order to support proper decision making.

Dr. Karin Drda-Kühn, managing director of Kultur und Arbeit e.V. – Association Culture & Work, is a trained art historian with a special interest in preservation activities beyond the traditional instruments and means. As coordinator and partner of European projects like EUROPETOUR, HERITAGE-PRO, HECTOR and SKIVRE she focuses on cultural tourism, on cultural, industrial and religious heritage valorization, and on community building. In 2017 she was nominated as a member of the working group "Skills, Training and Knowledge Transfer: Traditional and Emerging Heritage" of European Commission General Directorate Education and Culture.

Dr. Katharina Zanier works as assistant professor for classical archaeology at the Department of Archaeology of the Faculty of Arts of the University of Ljubljana and at the Institute for the Protection of Cultural Heritage of Slovenia, where she also acts as team manager for the ArcheoDanube project. Her basic research interest is focused on Roman architecture, building techniques, architectural furnishings and sculpture. She has led several excavations in Italy and Slovenia. She has also joined numerous transnational and cross-border collaboration projects. In focus of these projects was the sustainable use and valorisation of archaeological heritage for educational and touristic purposes. Since 2017 she is a member of the editorial board of the Slovenian Journal for the Protection of Monuments and of the publication series Archaeology on Slovenian Highways.



This is CM Ptuj, City Municipality Ptuj. The City Municipality Ptuj is a lead partner in the ArcheoDanube project, which is a very complex and responsible task that gives us also opportunity to upgrade our knowledge and spread our international network.

The City Municipality Ptuj recognizes cultural heritage as an important development component, both in strategic documents and in practice. CM Ptuj participated in international projects such as AD HOC (2006-2009) and VITO (2009-2012) with an emphasis on the preparation of a strategic plan for the development of the old city center based on cultural heritage.

A conservation plan for the Panorama Archaeological Park has already been prepared. In order to illustrate the city structure of the Roman Petoviona, a system of walking paths with signboards was set up in 2019. Copies of Roman monuments and urban equipment were placed next to those walking paths in the area of Panorama.



CM Ptuj participates as a co-financer of archaeological researches and other activities in the area of the Panorama hill, mainly led by renowned national institute. In 2019, the oldest Slovenian town celebrated the 1.950 th anniversary of the town's first mention in writing in the historical chronicles of Tacitus, with numerous events, exhibitions and workshops. The City Municipality Ptuj also supports other projects and activities related to the revival of the rich cultural heritage of Ptuj (carnival, Roman Games, Medieval games etc.).

The City Municipality Ptuj intends to establish an archeological park on Panorama hill, so we expect a transfer of a good and successful practicies in other countries and to carry out a pilot activity with an innovative presentation of archaeological heritage in the urban area. With the ArcheoDanube project we want to strengthen the positive attitude of citizens towards the archaeological heritage and belonging to the treasure throve of millennia – to the city in which we live today.
